Including music to accompany the visual, non-verbal language of gesture and emotion adds another layer of meaning to **A Midsummer Night's Dream**. The early modern English has its own music, using timing and rhythmic syllable placement. Synopsis

Overbearing elders cause four young Athenians to escape to the nearby forest, where they become entangled in the schemes of another overbearing elder, this time the magical king of the fairy folk. To confuse matters further, a troupe of amateur actors find themselves in the middle of the fracas. Somehow all is brought to rights, the right couples marry and even the amateur play is a success!

Act I

Midsummer Night's Dream

As Theseus, Duke of Athens, prepares for his marriage to Hippolyta, Queen of the Amazons, he is interrupted by a courtier, Egeus. Egeus has chosen the gentleman Demetrius as a husband for his daughter Hermia. However Hermia is in love with Lysander. Theseus orders her to obey her father, or else become a nun in the temple of Diana.

Naturally upset with this, Lysander and Hermia plan to elope that night. They share their secret with Hermia's friend Helena, who is desperately in love with Demetrius. However Demetrius wants the promised Hermia.



In the dark woods outside Athens, Lysander and Hermia are soon hopelessly lost. Demetrius, seeking Hermia, follows but gets lost as well. Helena follows Demetrius and she too gets lost. They are deep in the realm of the fairy folk.

Meanwhile, a group of working men are preparing a play to present before the Duke and his new bride. They have unwisely chosen the tragedy Pyramus and Thisbe. Nick Bottom, the weaver, demands to play Pyramus, while Flute, the bellows-mender, begrudgingly agrees to play his lover Thisbe.

Act II

Elsewhere in the forest, Oberon, magical king of the fairy folk, wants to spite his queen, Titania. She has refused to give him an Indian child gifted to her, so Oberon calls on Puck, his powerful but slow-witted sprite. Puck gathers a purple flower whose juice causes those touched with it to fall in love with the first thing they see.

Oberon overhears Helena and Demetrius arguing in the forest. It would be fun to meddle in their affairs, thinks Oberon, so he orders Puck to anoint Demetrius. Puck gets it wrong and anoints Lysander... when he wakes to see Helena he falls for her! Oberon does the job properly, but now both Lysander and Demetrius are in love with Helena.

Act III

The workers' rehearsals in the wood are overheard by Puck, who plays a trick on them by giving Bottom an ass's head. The workers flee in terror, but Bottom is lured towards the sleeping Titania. Oberon has put the magic juice on her... she wakes to see Bottom as an ass, and falls in love with him.

Meanwhile, Demetrius and Lysander are pursuing Helena. Helena is furious at what she takes as mockery. Hermia is jealous and confused about the lack of attention paid to her. Oberon and Puck enjoy the chaos, then Oberon commands Puck to put all to right again. The lovers' arguments have tired them out as they have chased one another through the woods. Exhausted, they fall asleep. Puck places a restorative juice on Lysander.



Act IV

After a wonderful pampering by Titania's fairies, Bottom falls asleep beside her. Oberon restores Titania's sight and wakes her. After expressing her dismay at the sight of Bottom, she reconciles with Oberon and agrees to give him the little Indian prince for his page.

Bottom is restored and he rejoins his friends as they prepare their performance. The lovers are woken: Lysander sees Hermia and falls in love with her once again.

Act V

Lysander is back with Hermia and Helena accepts that Demetrius is truly devoted to her. They agree to share the Duke's wedding day. The workers' play, 'Pyramus and Thisbe' is presented to acclaim before all the wedding guests. As the three couples retire to bed, Puck and the fairy folk return to bless the palace, its people, and you, gentle audience.
